MEDITATION OF THE DAY How He Is Glorified in Us

flows from him into mankind.... Souls united to Christ through faith and charity form, in fact, a body that is aptly called the Mystical Body of Christ.... The principal act of the Mystical Body of the Lord is the oblation of the sacrifice of the Mass. The priest offers the sacrifice in the name of the faithful, but it is principally Christ who offers himself through the priest. It is always the same and unique oblation of the sacrifice of the cross that is repeated in unbloody form, an act ever alive in the heart of Christ who does not cease interceding and offering himself to his Father for us. I would even say, under this aspect, that Christ continues to suffer for us, as the devotion to the Sacred Heart says—to suffer in his members and in his saints, as a mother suffers in her son when she sees him in pain. The sacrifice of the cross continues, then, in a mysterious but real way in the sacrifice of the Mass, and it is this act of oblation of the Son to his Father that sustains the world.

Life is poured out into the Mystical Body by means of the sacraments: by means of absolution that raises the dead members to life; through the Eucharist that conserves the life of grace and renews the fervor that venial sin has weakened; and finally by means of all the interior inspirations and all the actual graces with which the Lord favors us. It is a fountain of divine life that flows from him to us, streaming forth into everlasting life. How many times we have noticed this power of Christ: in our individual lives, through absolution and Communion; and in the social life of the Church, always rising from the worst persecutions younger and stronger! Hence, we should have confidence in this redemptive power of Christ. We should listen to his invitation: Come to me and I will give you rest. “In baptism I gave you a pure and shining soul,” he seems to say to us, “and see how spoiled is the one you have, but come to me and I shall refashion it. Come to me, all you who have darkened your intelligence and lost sight of the ideal, and I shall enlighten you. Come to me, you who have a conscience that has gone astray, and I shall set it straight. Come to me, you who have a weak will, and I shall strengthen it for you; and you who have a stubborn heart, come and I shall teach it anew the joy and love of God.” Jesus Christ has the power to lead us to our ultimate end and he alone can configure us to the Word of God because he is the Word. Knowing our sins, he wishes not only to heal us but through his blood to raise us up higher.



Mayo es el mes de la devoción a María la Santísima Madre, que se originó en Roma en el siglo XVIII para contrarrestar la inmoralidad y la infidelidad entre los estudiantes de una universidad allí.

Hacia fines del siglo XVIII, un celoso sacerdote jesuita, el Padre Lalomia, inició entre los alumnos del colegio romano de su Sociedad, la práctica de dedicar el mes de mayo a la Virgen. La devoción, que otros habían promovido en pequeña medida, pronto se extendió a otros colegios jesuitas ya toda la iglesia latina y desde entonces ha sido un rasgo habitual de la vida católica. Esta devoción ahora se ha extendido por la mayor parte de la Iglesia latina. Debido a que la festividad norteamericana del Día de la Madre cae en mayo, los católicos aprovechan este tiempo para recordar y tratar de emular el papel de María como madre. Por lo tanto, la devoción a María en el mes de mayo se centra tanto en María como modelo a seguir para las madres cristianas, como en la eterna castidad y pureza de María, y su fidelidad a la voluntad de Dios.

MARÍA: NUESTRA MODELO EN LA VIDA ORDINARIA

"No podemos olvidar que María pasó casi todos los días de su vida como millones de otras mujeres que cuidan de sus familias, crían a sus hijos y cuidan sus casas. María santifica las cosas ordinarias y cotidianas, lo que algunas la gente considera erróneamente como sin importancia e insignificante: el trabajo cotidiano, el cuidado de los más allegados, las visitas a amigos y familiares. Qué bendita cotidianidad, que puede estar tan llena de amor de Dios". Ofrezcamos hoy a nuestra Madre: Afectuosos detalles de servicio y atención a los más allegados".

May is the month of devotion to Mary the Blessed Mother, which originated in Rome in the 18th century to counter immorality and infidelity among students at a college there. Toward the end of the 18th century a zealous Jesuit priest, Father Lalomia started,

among the students of the Roman college of his Society, the practice of dedicating May to Our Lady. The devotion, which others had promoted in a small way, soon spread to other Jesuit Colleges and to the entire Latin church and since that time it has been a regular feature of Catholic life. This devotion has now spread through most of the Latin Church. Because the North American holiday of Mother's Day falls in May, Catholics take this time to recall and try to emulate Mary's role as mother. Therefore devotion to Mary in the month of May focuses both on Mary as a role model for Christian mothers, and Mary's ever lasting chastity and purity, and her fidelity to God's will.

MARY: OUR MODEL IN ORDINARY LIFE

"We can't forget that Mary spent nearly every day of her life just like millions of other women who look after their families, bring up their children, and take care of their houses. Mary sanctifies the ordinary, everyday things -- what some people wrongly regard as unimportant and insignificant: everyday work, looking after those closest to you, visits to friends and relatives. What a blessed ordinariness, that can be so full of love of God." Let us offer to our Mother today: Affectionate details of service and attention to those closest to us."
